Better Mobility & Access throughout This Important Travel Corridor

The CCTID is working with its partners to make travel to and from SR 32 easier and safer by making a series of coordinated improvements along SR 32 between Eastgate and Batavia.

Projects will be completed in a phased sequence as funding is secured for each component.

The work on SR 32 will eliminate the existing signals at GlenEste-Withamsville Road, Elick Lane and Old SR 74, and replace these access points with a partial interchange at GlenEste-Withamsville Road, a new interchange just east of Elick Lane, and an overpass at Old SR 74.

These improvements, which include an added through lane on SR 32 in each direction, will allow traffic to move from I-275 to Batavia on SR 32 without a traffic signal.

CCTID Makes Significant Progress On The Big 3



Aicholtz Road Connector

The Aicholtz Road Connector will reestablish a vital link in the Eastgate area's roadway network by reopening a portion of Aicholtz Road that was disconnected when I-275 was originally built. When improvements on I-275 at SR 32 were made in 2015, the underpass was reconstructed to allow local improvements on Aicholtz to take place.

A new center turn lane will ease congestion and reduce conflict points for turning traffic. Aicholtz also will be widened; there will be two travel lanes west of I-275 to Mt. Carmel-Tobasco Road — where the alignment also will be improved — and three travel lanes from I-275 to Eastgate Boulevard.

A new sidewalk on the south side of the street will support pedestrian activity throughout this corridor, and also improve connectivity to the Ivy Pointe area.

PHASE 1 of this project from Eastgate Boulevard to I-275 began in the summer of 2016.

PHASE 2 of this project from I-275 to Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road will be completed in 2017.



Wolfpen-Pleasant Hill Safety Improvements



A series of improvements are taking place along Wolfpen-Pleasant Hill Road to improve safety along this busy stretch of road. The existing roadway will be realigned, several new retaining walls will be built, and drainage improvements will be made to reduce water build-up and the related icing issues that have occurred on this road during winter months.

This project will significantly improve safety for motorists who drive along this section of Wolfpen-Pleasant Hill Road. The deterioration of the retaining walls, steep slopes, periodic icy road conditions and sharp curves will all be addressed in order to make the road safer for all who travel through this area.

Old SR 74 Widening from Olive Branch Stonelick Road to Armstrong Boulevard

Old SR 74 between Olive Branch-Stonelick Road and Armstrong Boulevard is being widened to improve safety and access along the Old SR 74 business corridor. The road will be widened to include a center turn lane, which will improve safety and the flow of traffic by reducing conflict points that can potentially lead to accidents.

These improvements will also support the recent extension of Old SR 74 to College Drive and better accommodate future traffic projections for this area.



Improved Quality of Life for Our Residents

South Afton Commerce Park

The CCTID is currently working with local officials to support the development of the South Afton Commerce Park area.

In early 2016, the Clermont County Community Improvement Corporation (CIC) purchased 242 acres of land at Half Acre Road and SR 32 in Williamsburg Township that will be developed as South Afton Commerce Park, a "business ready" site for manufacturers. Business ready sites are considered highly attractive to potential companies because they reduce the time it takes for companies to locate and start operations in a given location.

The CCTID is partnering with the CIC to manage the infrastructure investment that includes access to and from the site and site development.

This development is expected to create more than 3,500 jobs and lead to \$1.5 billion in economic activity per year once completed.



Clermont County Airport Runway Extension

The CCTID is working with local officials and the Federal Aviation Administration on the extension of the Clermont County Airport runway.

By extending the runway an additional 1,440 feet, the Airport will be able to accommodate light corporate jets, which will allow the county to recruit a broader range of companies with frequent corporate travel needs. With the ability to accommodate larger aircraft, the potential for greater economic development exists.

The improved runway will also benefit the UC Clermont aviation training program.

The CCTID is managing design and construction of the runway extension. This project is now under design, with the initial phases of this work beginning in 2016.
