CLERMONT COUNTY ENGINEER ANNOUNCES NEW CLOSURE ON CLOUGH PIKE Temporary closure & detour is part of Clough Pike Widening Project that will add third travel lane to improve safety and access for drivers

Batavia, OH – The Clermont County Engineer's Office today announced that the eastbound lane on Clough Pike from Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road to Ivy Pointe will be closed beginning Wednesday, August 28, 2013. Clough Pike traffic will be reduced to one-way westbound between Ivy Pointe and Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road. Eastbound traffic will be detoured south on Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road to east on SR 125 to north on Gleneste Withamsville, returning to Clough Pike. Clough Pike will reopen to two-way traffic at the end of the year.

The Engineer's Office also announced that the work related to the previous closure on Clough Pike west of Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road will conclude this Friday, August 23, and that portion of the road will reopen on Friday evening.

The current traffic pattern change and the related improvements are part of the Clough Pike Improvements Project. The Clough Pike project will add a third travel lane along a 1.3 mile section of Clough Pike, between Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road and Gleneste Withamsville Road. A center turn lane will be added, as well as a sidewalk along the north side of the road. Upgrades will be made to nearby traffic signals, and drainage improvements will also be completed along the project corridor.

"In addition to reduced congestion, less 'stop-n-go' traffic and improved safety for drivers, a new sidewalk will provide better pedestrian access to schools, churches and parks in the project area," said Pat Manger, Clermont County Engineer. Manger added that work along Clough Pike will continue through this year, with all work scheduled to be completed by the end of 2014. The Clough Pike Improvements Project is being managed by the Clermont County Transportation Improvement District, with support from the Clermont County Engineer's Office.
